Roadside Shrine

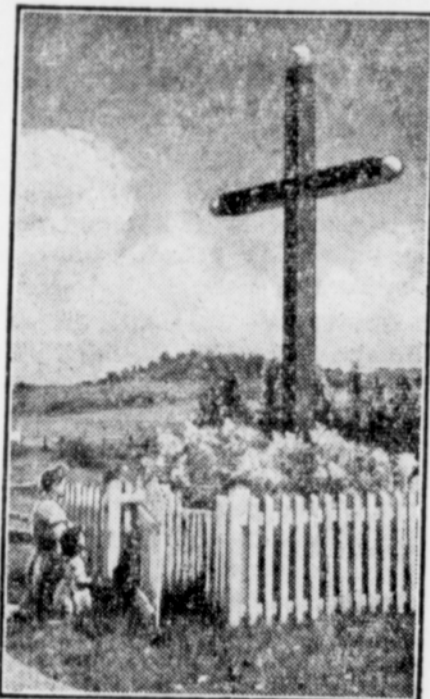
