## Local VFW To Buy Wheel Chair

Another wheel chair for use in the community has been ordered by the local VFW post and Auxiliary and they are accumulating funds for the purchase of a hospital bed with a plastic covered mattress to be made available when folks are ill in their home.

A wheel chair was bought some years ago by the Harbor Community club has been in use ever since and the one now on order will, on arrival, be loaned to a man in Harbor who cannot get around very handily.
