Azalea Lanes Opens To Capacity Crowd

The opening of Azalea Lanes Brookings' new bowling establishment, Tuesday evening was received with enthusiasm by the people of this area. Glen and Cleo Rogers, owners and operators of the new sports' business, were pleased and encouraged by the turnout.

Two teams from Crescent City played two teams from Brookings. Mr. Soelberg gave a bowling exhibition and instruction. A steady stream of people came and went from 7 p.m. until 12 o'clock.

The building 68 ft. x 105 ft. located at Spruce and Oak streets, just off Chetco Boulevard, is definitely an asset to Brookings. Ground was broken for Azalea Lanes May 20, and Roy Weideman was the builder. Made of concrete blocks with a truss roof eliminates the use of supports which would break up the floor space. Sufficient parking space around the building is available for the public. An attractive entrance greets you as you approach.

Finest On Coast

According to Jack Soelberg, representative for the National Bowling and Billiard Corp., Chicago who furnished the equipment, Azalea Lanes is one of the nicest bowling establishments on the coast and by far the finest on the Oregon coast.

The most modern equipment has been installed for this eight lane bowling alley. The alleys floored with maple are equipped with seeing eye which is used in league play to record crossing of the foul line. Semiautomatic pin setters are installed placing the pins with a press of a button after they are put in the rack, which speeds up the playing.

Crescent shaped benches are available for players and additional seating space is provided for the public looking on. The roomy interior houses a snack-bar, rest rooms and a meeting room.

Mr. and Mrs. Rogers, coming here off and on and watching this section of the coast for a number of years are originally from Portland. When asked to make a statement Mr. Rogers said, "We have faith in this area and wish to so conduct our business that it will be an asset to the community and become a recreation hall for the youth as well as the sport's fans."
