Nice Catches Made In Chetco River

The fishing is very good this week on the Chetco river according to Elmer Parker of Parker's Anchorage. Many are catching their limit which is two per day or four in one week. These for most part have been Chinook with a few silver sides being caught which were planted in the river. Forty three pounds is the largest that has been weighed at the Anchorage but there have been quite a large number caught weighing thirty eight to forty two pounds.

"The greatest number of fishermen are from southern California" said Mr. Parker but he has had cars of late from Ill., Penn., Ariz., and Ohio.

The winter season running from Oct. 13 to Nov. 15 increases the number of fish that can be caught by ten Jack salmon per day. Jack salmon are measured under twenty inches.

Mrs. Elmer Parker is improved this week and hopes to be out soon.

Dorothy Newton To Chicago With Oregon 4-H'ers

Two county extension agents have been named to accompany Oregon 4-H boys and girls to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, November 29 to December 4, by Burton Hutton, state 4-H club leader.

Miss Dorothy Newton, 4-H city extension agent in Portland, and Francis Skinner, Klamath county club agent, are this year's choice. They merited selection through community service of their 4-H work, said Hutton.

The two agents will assist in chaperoning the Oregon delegation on the Chicago trip and will also serve on Club Congress committees.

Miss Newton, an Oregon State college graduate, has been in Portland 4-H work since 1951. Prior to that time she was home agent in Washington and Curry counties and taught at the Newberg high school.

Skinner has been Klamath county 4-H extension agent since 1946. He is a graduate of Oklahoma A & M and served four years in the army before joining Oregon extension office.

Hunting Season To Be Extended

Although no date has been set for the opening of the deer hunting season at this date, it is hoped that humidity will reach a point soon whereby the hunters may safely enter the woods.

After a 3 day postponement of the opening from Oct. 1 to 4 and closure of virtually all hunting areas to entry, because of acute fire hazards, the deer hunting season was extended 11 days by the State Game Commission.

No extension or change of the deer season in eastern Oregon will be made except that the "Hunters Choice", antlerless deer season will be canceled in a section of Lake and Klamath counties.

Fire danger in Oregon's tinder-dry forests is on the increase again.
