Crescent City Host To Oregon Coast Association

The city of Crescent City, California, will be host to the Oregon Coast Association for their twenty-second annual convention, November 6-7-8.

The theme for this year's Oregon Coast Association convention will be "More Tourists in '53," and plans are under way for promotion and publicity work which will bring about just exactly that. It is expected that there will be in attendance over 200 members from as far north as Washington Beaches and as far south as a Smith River, California, for the three days of the convention.

Registration will start November 6, at 9:30 a.m. in the lobby of the Hotel Lauff, and the "kick-off" will be a "Hospitality Hour" with the Del Norte County Chamber of Commerce acting as hosts for this occasion.

Meetings will start at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, November 7, with an opening by President Charles Grayshel, of Brookings, Oregon. The noon luncheon will have a speaker well acquainted with the problems of the tourist business.

Lady visitors will not be forgotten. A style show is planned for their benefit on Friday afternoon, and plans are underway for a tour on Saturday afternoon, including the Trees of Mystery, local plywood plant and the Sea Wonders Alive Aquarium.

The Saturday session will be the busiest of the convention, when election of the new year's officers takes place.

Lee H. McLeod, president of the Redwood Empire association, will be guest speaker at Saturday's luncheon, and the Coos Bay Pirates are invited as guests at the final convention banquet, Saturday evening.

The finishing touch will be provided by President Grayshel and his Barbershop quartets at the "Gay Nineties" fun night where guests are planning to wear appropriate costumes and dance to appropriate music.

This year's convention is expected to be a rousing success and all members of the Oregon Coast Association are heartily invited to attend and bring their families and friends.

Crescent City Hit By Tidal Wave

A tidal wave which assaulted the Crescent City harbor unexpectedly on Tuesday, Nov. 4, was believed to be the product of the earthquake which struck the area near Japan with the force of one of history's strongest shocks.

Five boats capsized and the harbor was a mass of tangled boats and cables and other debris.

This same wave was felt much stronger in Hawaii and the Aleutian Islands at Adak and at Midway island in the Pacific.

Results Of City Election

Representing the city as councilman for the next four years will be Pete J. Lesmeister with a vote of 545, and Clive Manley with a vote of 501. Charles Young will serve for a period of two years, receiving 451 votes. Lura Leonard, first woman to run for the city council, received 329 votes. Nine names were written in with one vote for each name except one which received two votes.

There were 647 ballots cast, which is considerably higher than in September of 1950 when the first election was held. At that time Bob Dimmick received the highest number of votes cast with

'IKE' WINS PRESIDENCY

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower won the presidency by a record vote at the polls on Tuesday, defeating Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, who said, "My fellow citizens have made their choice; and I gladly accept it. I urge you all to give General Eisenhower the support he will need."

The flood of votes for Eisenhower and Nixon passed the thirty-one million mark, the largest popular vote ever cast for the high office, and the Eisenhower showing was even more impressive on the electoral vote scale, the one that counts in spelling out victory—442 for "Ike" and 89 for Stevenson.

General and Mrs. Eisenhower are in Augusta, Georgia, where they were warmly welcomed for much-needed rest after the exhaustive campaign.

Election Results Reach Public Slow

Serving on the counting board for the election were: Chairman, Gladys Kindell; judge, Verna Mendenhall; clerks, Gertrude Sutcliffe, Alice M. Rosen and Agda Bickner. This group worked all through the night until 5 a.m. Wednesday when they rested a couple of hours and then counted all day, finishing late that evening.

Counting became slower and slower as the tally sheets grew in length as there were wider skips from one name to another.

It has been suggested that another election two counting boards be used.

City Parking Meters Pay Off

From Oct. 6 to 31 the sum of \$515 was collected by the city from parking meters. Half of the amount collected is due on the meters until they are paid for. Fines for overtime parking amounted to \$77.50 for the period mentioned above.

Money is collected each week by Officers Brown and Cross. A clever push cart gadget with a flexible hose and cup that fastens on the opening made by the un-latching of the meters, is used. Pennies and dimes are counted with a machine and rolled by the
