Express Agency Is Brookings Need

How about your repair parts you need in a hurry? How about Christmas gifts you want to send by express? This effort to establish an express agency here in Brookings needs the help of each and every person in the Brookings-Harbor area. We need letters from each one of you so we have a complete picture to send to San Francisco. Many people are asking what they can do to help in getting enough information to present to the Railway Express agency headquarters in San Francisco. The following information is needed and wanted from each business and household in Brookings on your own letterhead:

1. The potential tonnage you would ship by express from Brookings if an express agency were located in this city.
2. The approximate number of shipments you would send from Brookings each year.
3. The approximate number of shipments you would have coming to Brookings each year and the approximate total weight per year.
4. From where will your shipments coming into Brookings originate?
5. Where will your shipments from this area go to?

The railway express minimum charges on most commodities at the present time are \$1.54 plus tax.

Packages weighing from 10 to 40 pounds are sent cheaper by express than by parcel post from areas over 1000 miles away, much faster than freight.

From Chicago auto freight takes about eight days, by carloading company to Portland and from Portland to Brookings by truck takes about two weeks, rail freight takes three to four weeks, express takes about five to six days.

This information will not obligate anyone but is vital to show the need for an agency here.

It is up to each and every citizen in Brookings-Harbor area to get behind this movement to help get an express agency here. Many do not realize just how much they will use it once it is established. It will never take the place of freight or parcel post but will be a welcome addition to the two.

Letters containing the above information should be sent to Mr. Leslie Woodriff, Harbor, Oregon. He is not interested in the operation of the agency himself but just trying to help get an agency established here. He hopes to present it with Mr. Dave Franklin and any other persons interested in helping to push the movement to the Railroad Express agency in San Francisco Nov. 17. Please write immediately as many letters are needed.

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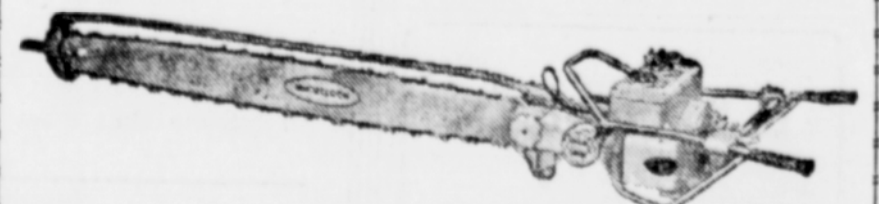
