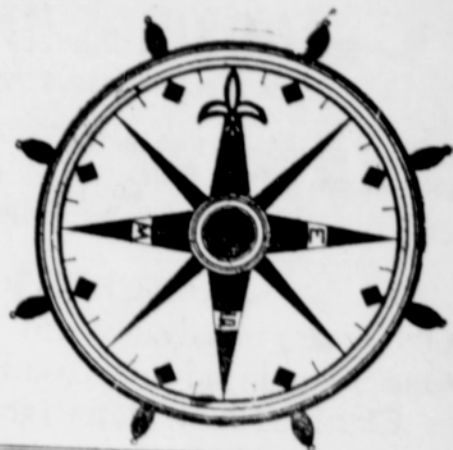

OSC Designs Portable Lamb Brooder-Feeder

A portable, heated lamb brooder that also provides feeding facilities for the ewe has been designed at the Oregon State college experiment station. Building costs, scale drawing plans, and advantages of the brooder are explained in new experiment station circular 515.

Titled "A Combination Lamb Brooder and Ewe Feeder," the circular was prepared by A. W. Warnick, animal husbandman; P. M. Rutland, shepherd, and L. W. Bonnicksen, agricultural engineer.

The authors point out that the brooder makes it possible for earlier lambing in cold areas. It can be set up in any sheltered area where there is adequate wiring for the number of light bulbs used as heating units.

Westwood Co. Mill Nears Completion

The planing mill owned by Al Hopper and E. C. Cole, known as the Westwood Co., is nearing completion. The mill is being rebuilt alongside of the site of the one that burned October 1 at a total loss on Easy street.

A steel burner has been erected which will eliminate much of the danger of fire. The framework, roof of the building are complete and new machinery is being installed. Electric power will be used instead of diesel. Operations will be more extensive and machinery is being placed for efficiency of output.

Vacancies On Electric Dredge

The Portland District, Corps of Engineers, has announced that, on or about November 24 it will have vacancies aboard a diesel electric hopper dredge for first, second, third and fourth assistant engineers; first, second, third and fourth mates; one machinist; one electrician; one boatswain; six dragtenders two cooks; five marine oilers; three quartermasters; ten deckhands; two wipers, and five mess attendants.

Persons qualified for these positions and interested in employment aboard the dredge should submit SF-57 (Application for Federal Employment) to the District Engineer, Corps of Engineers, 628 Pittock Block, Portland 5, Oregon. Competition in the contest this year, Jenkins stated, was so keen that the final decision of which two should get the calves was decided by drawing the names out of a hat.

Glen is a member of the Langlois Livestock club led by H. S. Cadman, and Janet is a member of the Winchuck Livestock club, led by Earl Henry. Both of these calves will be exhibited at the 1953 Curry county fair after the members have had them and fed them for a period of nine months.
