Seal Campaign Starts Next Week

The 46th annual Christmas Seal Sale campaign under the auspices of the Curry County Tuberculosis and Health association opened last Monday, Nov. 17 and will run until Christmas day, Dec. 25.

This year's Christmas Seal, whose sale supports the year-round tuberculosis control programs of the 3,000 voluntary state and local associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis association throughout the country, features more prominently than ever before the red Double-Barred Cross, the registered emblem of the National Tuberculosis association. The reason is that this is the 50th anniversary of the Double-Barred Cross as the international symbol of the crusade against tuberculosis. The Cross covers nearly half of the surface of the 1952 Christmas Seal and is lighted by a glowing candle set in an old-fashioned, brass candlestick against a green background.

Christmas Seals will be mailed this weekend to 2400 Curry county families under the leadership of Mrs. Irene Koeller of Brookings, county seal sale chairman. She is being assisted by the following volunteer workers throughout the county:
