Pioneer Passes

Rhoda Cornwall Prock, born in Curry county Feb. 18, 1879, died at Crescent City Nov. 18. She was a daughter of Thomas and Ida Post Cornwall, who were married Oct. 31, 1893, by Charles Zumwalt. John was earlier listed as a stepson of James Haft, living on Crystal Creek in northern Curry.

The couple had one daughter, Ora, who was born in March, 1895, and married Robert Perry March 30, 1915, and the whole family moved to the Smith River valley 22 years before Rhoda's death.

Survivors listed are two sisters, Mrs. Gussie (Andrew) Farrier of Sheridan, and Mrs. Jesse Welch of Sixes, and granddaughters Mrs. Martina Kinne, Roberta Shipp of Smith River, Juanita Snider, Maxine Costa, Carol Adams and Marian Brack, Crescent City, and two grandsons, Robert and Nick Perry, also of Crescent City. There are 18 grandchildren.

Rhoda was buried in the I.O. O.F. cemetery, at Crescent City.

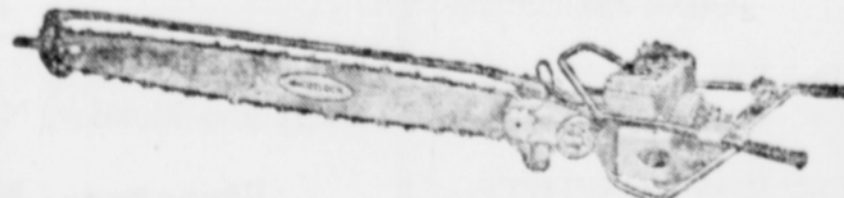
