

For What It's Worth State Forester Advises Christmas Tree Cutters

SALEM, Nov. 27—Assistant state forester Lynn F. Cronemiller said today that the state forestry department has been stressing an education program which will aid people in eliminating wasteful and harmful Christmas tree cutting practices. He advised that Christmas trees should come from marginal lands which are not to be used permanently for forests; from Christmas tree "farms" where trees are grown commercially for Yule trade; from pasture lands where the trees are not desirable; from forest thinning and from the farm woodlands.

The forester reported that no Christmas trees will be cut from state forests this year as many are understocked and extensive planting and aerial seeding programs are under way in such areas as the Tillamook Burn and similar tracts. He advised that commercial tree choppers would be required to obtain a harvesting permit from the state fore-

er's office before removing the Yule trees from private or public lands. This permit is in addition to permission and sale of trees by the landowner.

For those Oregonians who plan to cut their own tree, the following guides have been suggested by Cronemiller:

1. Don't cut your tree close to the road and spoil the beauty of the roadside.
2. Secure permission before cutting from private or public property.
3. Don't cut all of the trees from one patch.
4. Don't cut the top from a large tree.
5. When you cut a tree, leave a branch or two on the stump. A branch will develop later into another tree, and save several years growing time.
6. Be certain you are satisfied with the tree of your choice before you cut it. Wasted trees are wasted years.

As a final word of caution, the forester urged extreme caution in using lighted candles on the inflammable conifers. Place your

tree in a cool part of the room—keep it away from heaters, stoves and other sources of fire.
