Library News

Last Tuesday evening there was a better attendance at the library board meeting, held in the V.F.W. hall dining room, at which Mrs. Jessie Judkins, treasurer of the association, reported cash in hand for the new building amounted to \$2,692.26 and that couple more organizations had sent in their pledges since the last meeting. Several new memberships were also reported and a contribution of \$50 from a couple.

Mrs. Erma Rice, president, reported she had a letter and a phone call from the San Francisco office of the general services administration urging immediate filing of a Federal Internal Revenue tax exemption certificate by the library association before conditional title to the proposed site can be issued. An alternative is the filing and transfer of authority to the city of Brookings merely in order to verify tax exemption. Both of these avenues are being pursued.

Just as soon as the property is pegged off a bulldozer will move in and grade down the building site. Construction materials will then be delivered and as soon as these are available work will begin, according to Jack McCarton, who has supervision of that part of the project. There is insufficient material available for an entirely finished building but apparently enough to make a structure in which the large collection of books can be safely housed and better available than in the present cramped quarters.

Still more volumes have been made available with contributions from Mrs. Kathryn Reekman and Mrs. Arthur Crook and the Garden club has authorized the purchase of "Make Your Own Merry Christmas," by Ann Wertsmer, but the board asks that further donations of volumes be held back until the new building is ready for them as, in their present cramped quarters they just cannot be accommodated.

Obituary of John Wesley Isenhardt

John Wesley Isenhardt was born in Salem, West Virginia, Jan. 9, 1865. He went to Kansas with his brother as a young man. While in Kansas, at the age of 26 years, he was united in marriage to Bessie Randolph. To this union were born 11 children, one of whom died in infancy.

The Isenhardts traveled throughout the middle west until they came to Lake View, Ore., in 1909, and then on to the Pacific Coast to Brookings, Ore., in 1913.

The greater part of the past year Mr. Isenhardt lived with his son, Everett, and family, Langlois. John Isenhardt was in very poor health for a number of years. On Nov. 30, 1952, he passed away at the age of 87 years, 10 months and 21 days.

Surviving are four daughters, Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Nellie Gilson, Mrs. Modena Cooper, and Mrs. Luella Fitzhugh of Brookings; two sons, Howard and Everett, 11 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Services were held Wednesday, Dec. 3, at Community Baptist church, Brookings, with Rev. Easterly and Rev. J. L. Mumbower officiating. Interment was at Smith River cemetery.

Livestock Assc.

Meeting, Dec. 20

The annual meeting of the Curry County Livestock association will be held at Gold Beach Saturday, Dec. 20, starting at 10:00 a.m. in the county courthouse, according to Rod McKenzie, president of the Curry County Livestock association.

At a recent meeting of the directors of the livestock association meeting in the county extension office with the government trappers, George Copeland and Lee Hildreth, plans were

made for establishing predatory animals control bait stations at Watches Butte, Calf Ranch, Edson Butte, Baker Ranch in the north end and Signal Butte, Wild Horse Prairie, High Prairie, Saddle Mountain or Mineral Hill and Quail Prairie in the south end of Curry county. The livestock association is purchasing the bait horses and these are being put

out by members of the association working with the government trappers. This is one of the control measures being used for the control of coyotes and predatory animals in Curry county, according to Clifford Jenkins.
