Editor, The Pilot: Our mission chief in Korea has just sent us a most pitiful picture of the forgotten children in Korean orphanages. They are there, he says, because their homes were in the path of the war, their parents its victims. They were left alone, dirty, sick, suffering from malnutrition and exposure and in many cases near death.

There are 777 children in Scout's Chonjin Won, Hemyong Children's home, Wanbulgyo Bohwa, Samsong Hakwon and Mulka Children's home.

All these children are friendless, frightened and most of them have been attacked by vermin. Many have worms. These or-

Parents Sued For \$50,000 In Car Death Of Girls

Two suits asking damages totalling \$50,000 were filed in the county clerk's office last week as an aftermath of an automobile accident which cast the lives of two 16-year-old girls on Dec. 5, 1951.

phans have been picked up lying on the streets, at garbage dumps and along railroad tracks where they were foraging for food and fuel. Although the orphanages are filled to capacity, they operate on the principle there is always room for another. They need food and clothing for these children to whom they have given sanctuary, sympathy and understanding.

A CARE \$10 food package contains meat, fish, flour, sugar, rice, egg powder and other things which will feed a child for a month. A Korean underwear parcel has three pairs of long, warm underwear and several pairs of stockings and socks. They await orders from American donors. A contribution in any amount may be sent to CARE, 215 S. E. 9th Ave., Portland, Oregon.

The suits were brought by Charles and Alice Rausch and Archie P. and Malisa Hendricks against Wilson, Mae and Margie Freeman. All parties to the litigation are residents of Brookings.

The plaintiffs, parents of the dead girls, Fae Rausch and Pauline Hendricks, are each asking \$25,000 as damages for wrongful death.

Margie Freeman, who is one of the defendants in the action together with her parents, was the driver of the car which overturned two miles north of Smith River on Highway 101. She was also injured in the accident.

The suit alleges negligence and recklessness on the part of the driver.—Del Norte TriPLICATE.

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
