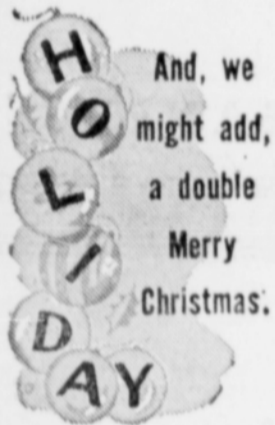


Parking Section Alloted To Bikes

Grace Stevenson Laid To Rest

Funeral services for Grace P. Stevenson, 69, of Brookings, were held at the Community Baptist church Friday, Dec. 19, at 2:00 p.m., with the Revs. Nick Neufeld and J. L. Mumbower officiating. Interment was in the William James Ward cemetery.

Mrs. Stevenson was born April 24, 1883, at Aitkin, Minn., the oldest child of Margaret and Robert Polley. In 1907, she received her degree in education at the University of Minnesota, then came west to Washington and taught until her retirement in 1940. On May 30, 1941, she married Dr. James E. 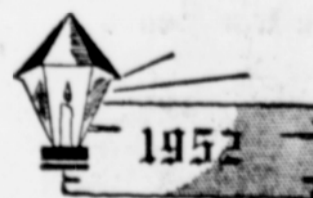
