Usually one lesson is enough for the beginner in such activities. Although he still realizes that there is work to be done, he rapidly arrives at the conclusion that someone else had better do it. Once in a while a truly valiant one thumbs his nose at the yelping curs on the edge of the pack and goes on to become a valuable leader in the community. But the valiant are few.

Why there should be those who ridicule the efforts of the few who are willing and able to work for the betterment of all has always been one of the mysteries peculiar to man. The easiest conclusion to be reached is that those who jeer are envious of the successful accomplishment which they are incapable of achieving.

Dr. Charles Bradley, noted scientist of California Institute of Technology, has a word of encouragement for those hurt by the seeming lack of appreciation. He reminds that "Any yellow dog can bark at the heels of the horse that is pulling the plow."

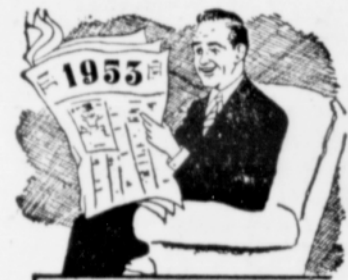
