SEAFOOD WALDORF

2 tablespoons butter or margarine	3 6-oz. cans lobster meat, diced or
1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced	1 lb. fresh cooked lobster meat, diced
1 tablespoon minced onion	1/2 cup dry Vermouth
1 lb. fresh or quick-frozen scallops	1 teaspoon Ac'cent (pure monosodium glutamate)
	2 cups medium white sauce
	1/2 cup heavy cream

Melt butter or margarine; add mushrooms; cook 5 minutes. Add onions and scallops; cook 5 minutes. Add lobster; cook, covered, until hot. Add Vermouth, Ac'cent and white sauce. Cook over hot water 10 minutes. Stir in cream; heat. Serve on fluffy rice.
