## Neufeld Twins Second in National Toni Award

Twin girls born on New Year's day at 1:21 and 1:41 a.m. to Rev. and Mrs. N. N. Neufeld of Stayton, Ore., were second place winners in a national Toni Permanent Wave Co award, given to the first born twins in the United States in 1953.

Prizes valued at \$500 were awarded the girls, including a twin baby carriage, beds, two innerspring mattresses, two cribs, a year's supply of baby food, a 12-volume set of books, and a collection of baby dresses.

The twins are not identical, according to Dr. Burl Betzer, attending physician. One weighed 6 pounds 1 ounce, the other 7 pounds, 6 ounces.

Mrs. Neufeld was ready with the names Gwen Ellen and Beth Marie. The girls have a brother, Gerald Curtis, seven years, and a sister, Sandra Kay, 5 years.

Rev. and Mrs. Neufeld were residents of Brookings three years ago when he was pastor of the Brookings Community church before going to Stayton, and the family is a frequent visitor to the community.

A front page article on Friday, Jan. 2, and a picture of the twins and their mother on page four of the Oregonian on Saturday, Jan. 3, announced the twins' birth.

The home extension units of Curry county will begin their tailoring workshop, according to Mrs. Sylvia Lee, home extension agent, starting Jan. 8 and 9. The series of five workshops, one a week, will train the project leaders to make a tailored garment complete from yard goods to finished garment.

Murle Scales, extension clothing specialist from Oregon State college, will be here to get the leaders started on their fitting problems. The north end of the county will meet with Mrs. Mary Woodworth Thursday, Jan. 8, and the south end will meet Jan. 9, at Chetco Grange hall.

In order to reach the forty ladies who have prepared themselves for the tailoring project by taking the previous lessons over a three-year period in cotton dress and the better dress workshops and the recent tailoring preliminary course, it is necessary to give this five-week intensified course to project leaders so they can share their knowledge with those in their community and later we hope those forty women will feel it a pleasure to share what the project leaders have shared with them, according to Mrs. Lee, home demonstration agent. Thus the knowledge of materials and construction can be made available to every homemaker.

## Dewey Billy Killed On New Year's Day

Dewey Billy was killed Jan. 1 at Rivers End, Calif., at 6:40 p.m., when struck by a Chevrolet pickup driven by Lonnie Denn, Jr., of this place.

Mr. Billy, 61 years old, was understood to have been under the influence of alcohol and was walking very nearly in the middle of the highway when struck. Mr. Denn was driving not more than 45 miles an hour and did not have a chance to miss Billy.

The hearing was held Monday Crescent City in the Del Norte county court. The verdict of the jury stated that Mr. Billy came to his death through "an unavoidable accident, being struck by a pickup driven by Lonnie Denn, Jr., whom we find in our opinion was in full control of said vehicle at time of accident."

## Man Loses Hand In Dynamite Blast

While working with dynamite on Sunday, John Ray of Carpenterville lost part of a hand when he returned to investigate a setting of the explosive that had failed to go off.
