Essay Contest For H. S. Students

Students in the 11th and 12th grades of public and private high schools in Oregon are being urged to enter the national essay contest sponsored by the president's committee on employment of the physically handicapped. The governor's committee in this state is cooperating with the national organization.

Five national prizes of U. S. bonds in the following amounts are being awarded the winners: \$1,000, \$400, \$300, \$200 and \$100. State prizes, also in bonds, are \$100, \$50 and two of \$25. In addition to the above prizes, the national winners have had their expenses paid to Washington, D.C., for the past five years and it is expected that the national organization of the Disabled American Veterans will make the same contribution this year.

This is the fifth year that the government-sponsored essay has been approved by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

The subject for the 1953 essay contest is "The Physically Handicapped, A National Asset." J. Richard Smurthwaite, Jr., chairman of the governor's committee for Oregon, has received considerable information on the contest rules and is anxious to mail it to those students and teachers who might be interested. The closing date for receipt of entries in this state has been set for Feb. 20.
