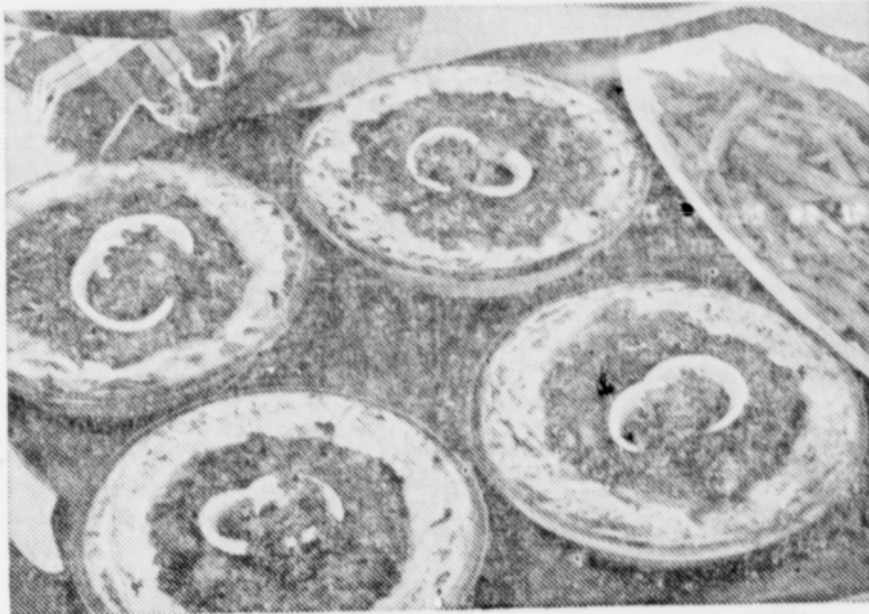

Tasty Meal-In-A-Dish

For good eating try:

Meat Pies in Potato Crusts
(Makes 4 servings)
4 medium-sized potatoes, diced
1 medium-sized onion, finely chopped
4 tablespoons Starlac nonfat dry milk

1 teaspoon salt
1 pound ground lean beef
1/2 cup Starlac nonfat dry milk
1/4 cup chili sauce
1 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
1 egg

Cook potatoes and onions together in salted boiling water until tender, about 20 to 25 minutes. Drain. Mash; stir in 4 tablespoons Starlac nonfat dry milk powder and salt; beat well. Divide mashed potato mixture into fourths and spread four 6-inch pie plates with potato mixture. Combine beef, 1/2 cup Starlac nonfat dry milk powder, chili sauce, salt, pepper and egg; blend thoroughly. Fill each potato lined pie plate with one-fourth of beef mixture. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Garnish with onion rings and parsley.
