**Chetco Aux. 3087 Gold Beach Invites
Celebrate Feb. 6 Masons and IOOF**

Mrs. Shirley Brannin, madam president of Chetco Auxiliary No. 3087, Fraternal Order of Eagles, reported yesterday that the Eagles will celebrate their 55th anniversary on Feb. 6. The organization was founded in Seattle, Wash., on Feb. 6, 1898.

Mrs. Brannin stated that Ladies' Auxiliaries to the Aeries were first instituted in 1926. Membership in the Aeries is restricted to males. By 1944, Mrs. Brannin said, there were only 360 auxiliaries throughout the Eagle jurisdiction. Eagle units have been established throughout the United States, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, Guam and the Philippines.

Since 1944, however, auxiliaries have more than tripled their numbers and at the present time, there are more than 1100 ladies' units possessing a membership greater than 150,000. Such rapid strides, Mrs. Brannin explained, has led the Grand Aerie, the

"Our biggest program," Mrs. Brannin said, "is our Memorial Foundation. The Memorial Foundation was set up to help the sons and daughters of Eagle members who died as a result of military service during or following the second world war."

The foundation provides complete medical, dental, surgical, clinical and optical care as well as affording educational grants to these children. At present, there are 1346 children in the foundation "family." The Korean campaign, Mrs. Brannin said, has added many children.

The local auxiliary was instituted on Dec 16, 1951, Mrs. Brannin said.
