Along Azalea Row

Rainfall in January amounted to 23.65 inches according to official figures from Mrs. Minna Akers, local weather observer. Heaviest downpour came on the 17th when over 6 inches fell.

Here are some statistics obtained from Professor Hi Potenus of the State University. He says that the rainfall on the 17th of January amounted to over 600 tons per acre. For the month the downpour amounted to 2700 tons per acre or nearly two million tons per square mile. My goodness! Figures on a county-wide basis would be so huge as to be incomprehensible, so why quote them. Apparently everyone had their fill of rain. Even the goldfish looked disgusted whenever the weather report come over the radio.

In spite of the heavy downpour in January, we do not have the satisfaction of seeing a new record established. Rainfall of 23.65 inches was exceeded in January 1950 with 23.97 inches and in November 1942 with 25.61 inches. Lightest rainfall in January in recent years was in 1949 when less than 2 inches fell. Normal for the month is about 12 inches. January is now well behind us and with this wet month out of the way it seems to me that the worst half of the year is over.
