

CURRY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION

with the referendum.

Following the public hearing last December the State Soil Conservation committee found that a soil conservation district would be practical and feasible for farmers in the area, and ordered the referendum for Feb. 24.

"The coming Curry county referendum is creating keen interest among the farmers of the area," Cecil Watt, chairman of the organization committee, said today

"No agricultural issue has captured the interest of Curry county people as has the coming soil conservation district referendum. Everyone has worked hard to bring the district issue to the referendum stage. We have needed just such a district for a long, long time. Many of our farmers need technical and engineering help on a lot of land problems. We see in this district a way to build a more profitable and permanent agriculture. Instead of trying to do our own tough land jobs single-handed we can do them much quicker and better through the action type of program which districts promote."

"I hope every landowner in Curry county will vote for this district program which we all need. And one thing every voting landowner should know, there's nothing compulsory about soil conservation. No one will tell you to do the job. It's up to each of us to set the pace. That's one of the things I like about districts, they put every farmer on his own. But the technical help is there if we want to use it. Soil conservation districts cannot levy taxes, make assessments or issue bonds," Mr. Watt pointed out.

Two-thirds of the votes cast at the coming elections must be favorable to insure passage of the coming soil conservation referendum.

Three supervisors will also be elected at the referendum. Later two additional landowners will be appointed to make up the five-man district board.

The farmers' district organization committee say the new district will take in the entire county.
