

County High School Tourney Won By Brookings Bruins

Brookings won the county high school basketball tournament held at Gold Beach Thursday through Saturday. This is the sixth year they have captured the title under the guidance of Coach Guthrie.

On Friday evening the Bruins played Gold Beach in a close game leading only in the last quarter. The final score was 51 to 46.

Saturday evening B.H.S. scoring 28 points in the first quarter went on to defeat Port Orford for the Curry county championship, 72 to 62. The score at the half was 41 to 22.

Port Orford started with a rush at the beginning of the second half and by the end of the third were trailing Brookings, 53 to 44.

The last quarter was nip and tuck with first one team and then the other scoring points. Although trying hard the Port Orford never quite caught the title-bound Bruins of Brookings.

Boyd and Ray Western paced the Brookings scoring with 20 and 17 points while Port Orford high score men were Flake and Penrl, both with 20 points.

The three Western brothers Ray, Ron and Boyd, were selected on the first all-county team.

Old Catholic Church Erected In Nineteen Fifteen

Removal of the "Old Rugged Cross" from the original Catholic church which is to be used for other phases of church work, lately brings to mind the date of its erection. Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Driskell came into the area via a basket pulled from a ship standing off the point, to the rocks on shore before the original pier or the old mill had been started in 1912. They then were taken up the Chetco to the old Ferry Ranch where a ferry operated across the river at that time.

This is now owned by "Bull" Miller.

Early mill employees were housed at the ranch until homes could be built near the planned mill. Mr. and Mrs. Driskell lived for many years in the house now owned by Fred Fox across from the Community church.

A small community hall was built where the church now stands. A new Catholic church was built in 1915. This is the building now being converted to other uses by the parish and Father Hamilton. The altar was donated by Pedrolli brothers. A fine plan for Brookings was laid

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out by Mr. Maybrick, who designed the Palace of Fine Arts for the San Francisco Exposition. It is hoped the Driskells and others who are familiar with historical facts concerning the area will provide the new library with a detailed record.
