CITY COUNCIL PONDERS PROBLEMS

The City Council met on Tuesday night to discuss and make decisions on many issues requiring their consideration.

The committee on street signs announces that signs, both post and lettered panel, are about ready to set up.

Elmer Bankus presented a sketch for the approval of the council to subdivide property north and east of the bank. It was announced that State Auditor Russell B. Morgan of Salem would come to audit the city's books some time in July after the ending of the fiscal year.

A petition was presented to open a new street from the corner of Hillside and Oak, adjoining the school property on the west, to intercept the Cemetery road, through unplatted private property.

The police department will begin to issue warrants for those traffic violators who hold three or more unpaid violation notices. They will be fined additional costs as well as the violation fine.

Tax Exemptions For '98 War Vets

Spanish war veterans henceforth will be entitled to a \$1500 state property tax exemption without having to submit proof of disability, as the result of a legislative measure signed into law Monday by Governor Paul Patterson.

The measure, house bill 3, carries the emergency clause so goes into effect immediately. The State Department of Veterans' Affairs said this will permit Spanish war veterans to take advantage of the relaxed provisions ahead of the April 1 deadline for applying for the tax exemption.

Previously Spanish war veterans had to submit proof of 40 per cent or more disability when they applied to their county assessors for the annual tax exemption, along with veterans of World Wars I and II and the Korean conflict.

House bill 3, introduced by Representative Francis Ziegler, puts veterans of the Spanish-American war, the Philippine insurrection and the Boxer rebellion into the same group as Mexican, Civil and Indian war veterans, whose tax exemptions have always been granted without proof of disability.

Widows of veterans of any war are also entitled to the tax exemption. Application by persons entitled must be filed annually on or before April 1 with the county assessor in the county where the property is located.

L. L. Howe of Orick has been our guest for the past week but was able to find a house and moved his wife to Brookings this week.

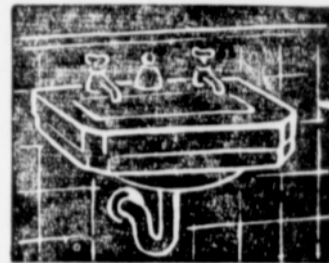
Kenneth Wignes of Canyonville spent a week with us while looking for a house. We are glad to say that he found one and his family is now new residents.

church as it has to give up the present location for the new Presbyterian church building.

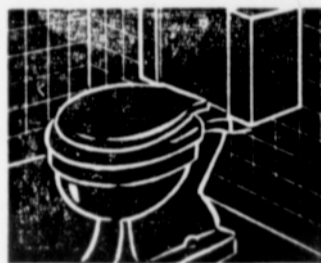
The Presbyterian church held services in the dining room of the Inn last Sunday and will continue to do so until it has another place ready.
