Deer Browse On Lilies

Deer from the uplands, seeking new and tender growth, are finding excellent feeding on the young leaves of the lily bulb plants. Bulb growers are in some cases sustaining considerable loss.

The six-acre lily field of Lloyd Morris on Dawson Flat has recently suffered a loss estimated at approximately \$2000. A half dozen deer have been coming nightly to browse in the lily field and the state police were notified and have been issuing permits to shoot the offenders, and the officers themselves spent several nights in ambush watching for them.

South of town in the Harbor district, a young deer, in attempting to jump a fence into a lily field, was caught by her hind legs in the wire and was found dead.

However, a happier deer story was reported by Mr. and Mrs. Olaf Lundeen. A fine big buik comes to a field near by their home where a cover crop of oats is the best feeding he has had for some time. Every morning they watch for him and they have become quite attached to him as he stands gracefully alert to distant sounds or contentedly feeds.
