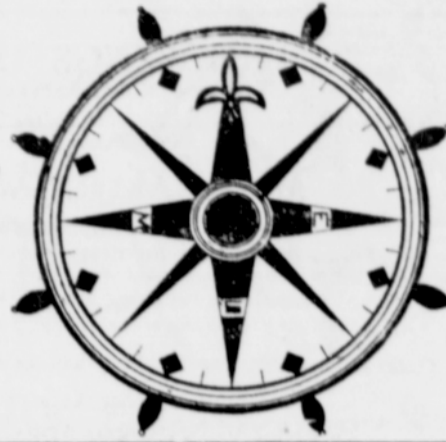

The first annual City Bowling Tournament will be held March 28 and 29 by Beaverettes Ladies Bowling league at Azalea Lanes.

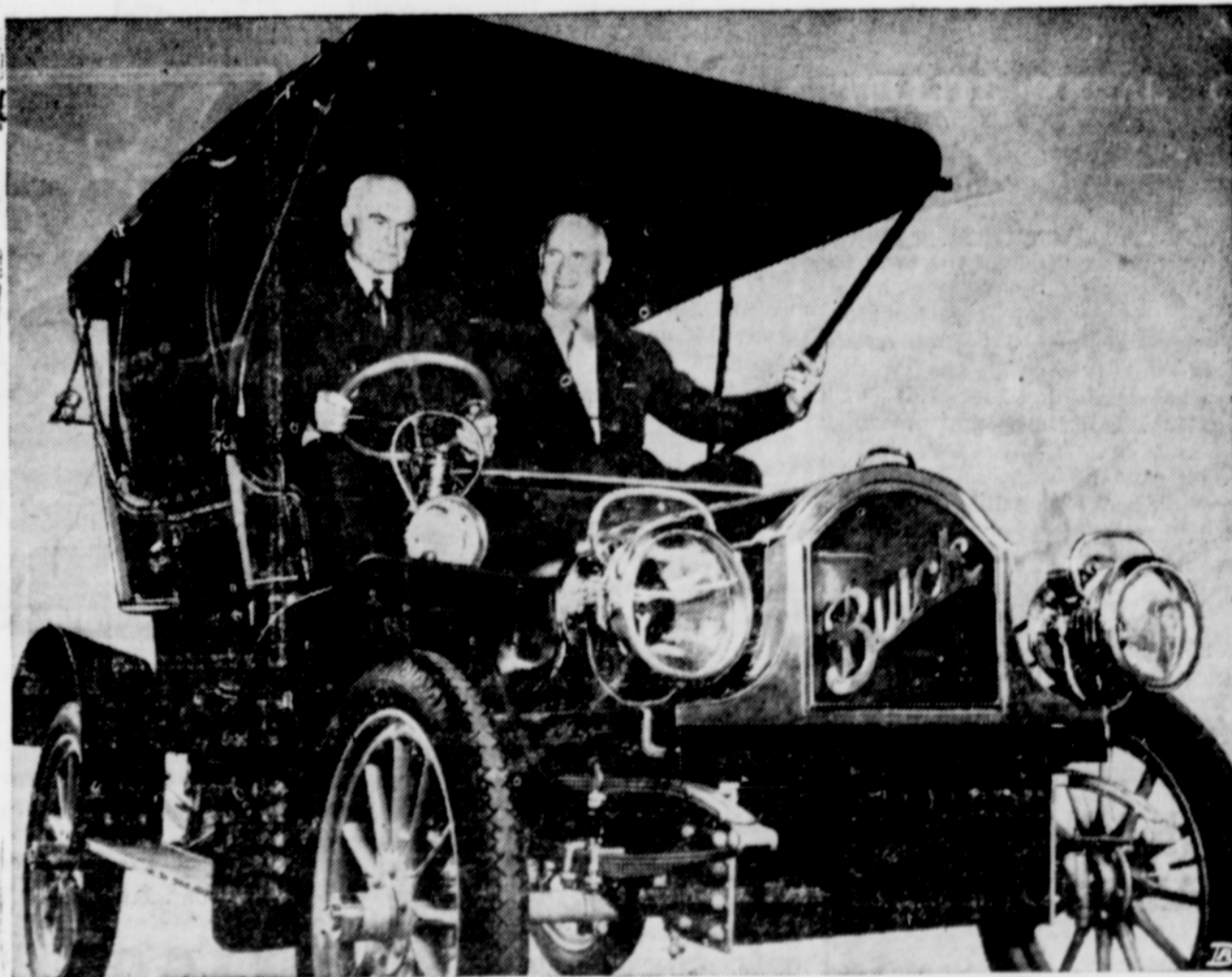
