ite Club netted \$32 with their sandwiches and coffee. Glen Hurst donated the "hot dogs," and the local bakery donated the buns. The Rebekahs made \$32.80 on cake sales and the P.T.A.; \$28 on candy. The new Lions Club, in their first appearance in a community project, netted \$32 with their wheel booth. The American Legion, Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce with dart games, fish pond and grab bag concessions, each netted \$16.50 to \$25. The Explorer Boy Scouts sent Tommy Smith and Steve Johnson to man the checking room and they netted \$3.80; and also acted as handy men around the hall all afternoon helping others. The Rod & Gun Club did not have a booth but sent a check for \$10 as their contribution and also furnished the wheel to the Lions Club. The cakes sold at dutch auction brought in another \$8.87.

Del Norte Chamber Supports Gilbert Creek Plea

In a well written letter to the California Department of Public Works, the Del Norte Chamber of Commerce has exhibited splendid cooperation with our own chamber in bringing this serious matter before the proper authorities. The letter is reprinted below at the request of the Brookings Chamber of Commerce so that we may all be informed at the action being taken not only by ourselves, but also by Del Norte county.

Dear Mr. McCoy:

Reference is made to Highway 101 immediately south of the Oregon line.

Nearly two months have passed since the closing of this highway due to bridge failure during the January storm and absolutely nothing has yet been done to repair this bridge at Gilbert Creek so that normal traffic may resume.

All traffic, including heavy log trucks, lumber trucks and trailers and tank trucks are still detoured over the old county roads for a distance of more than three miles. This road has now reached an extremely hazardous condition.

North of Brookings the State of Oregon has met a much greater problem where miles of highway was destroyed and it is with shame that we of the great state of California must admit that the repair of one little bridge over a tiny creek has not yet begun.

Your attention is also directed to the fact that the repair of the bridge on the county road over which traffic is now routed was all done by private parties at their own expense and most of these people were from Oregon.

No valid excuse can be found for this neglect of a single small repair job at a point on the highway which last year carried more than 680,000 persons in 237,000 vehicles.

Please give this matter your immediate attention and advise at your earliest convenience.
