The valuable information that she imparted to the ladies was taken from first-hand experience with fuchsias which she grows as a hobby in her garden in Portland. Among other things, she demonstrated and recommended pinching back of plants at this time of year to increase the size and number of blooms and to root prune around the plant to make sturdier growth. Mrs. Brady illustrated her talk with three potted fuchsia plants from Mrs. Bathianys garden with a visual lesson in pruning.

The hostesses for the dessert luncheon were Mrs. E. E. Hanscom, Sr., Mrs. Louis Peterson and Mrs. Edith Ackley. The table decorations of Cryptomaria and Forsythia served the dual purpose of brightening the luncheon table and providing slips for the members to take home.
