Salmon-Steelhead Cards Expired

Salmon-steelhead cards expired Monday, March 16. The game commission urges all anglers to mail their cards to the commission.

This year Dr. John Rayner, who heads the commission's fishery division stresses the need for ample returns because the catch will be broken down on the basis of individual streams.

Through their records on these cards sportsmen can make a valuable contribution to sport fish management in Oregon. Total sports fishing take as well as trends in the salmon and steelhead catch are obtained from the cards.

In the period March 1, 1951 to March 15, 1952 the sport catch in Oregon totalled 111,817 salmon and 72,183 steelhead. The cards are used for salmon and steelhead 20 inches or more in length with a limit of 20 for the season. The angler punches his card for each fish and writes in the date and stream on the card.

New salmon-steelhead cards are available at all game license agencies.

Oregon State Civil Defense

Oregon had seven civil defense observers at the Nevada proving grounds Tuesday, March 17, to witness an atomic explosive pack a wallop of 15,000 tons of TNT. The blast was unleashed on two ordinary frame houses. One house was about a half mile from ground zero, and the other two was about three times as far away. Each house was equipped with indoor bomb shelters and contained home furnishings. Civil defense officials examined the buildings before and after the explosion.

Make Easter Happy For The Disabled

Support of the annual Easter Seal sale of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults was urged by Governor Paul Patterson. The sale is now in progress and will continue through Easter Sunday, April 5.

"I am most interested in the great humanitarian work being carried on by the Oregon society on behalf of the state's physically disabled children and adults, and sincerely hope the people of Oregon will respond generously," the governor said.

"Easter Seals are a symbol of hope for hundreds of Oregonians who rely on the Oregon Society for special training, treatment and education to restore them to places in normal every-day living.

"There is considerable need for expanding the work of the Oregon Society," the governor continued, "and this can be accomplished only if the people support

the Easter Seal sale. The society's work is recognized as outstanding by persons closely identified with the physically disabled in our state."

T. Lawson McCall of Portland, society president, explained the directors are hopeful this year's sale will exceed any in history so that expansion plans can be carried out. Largest project of the Easter Seal agency is the hospital school for crippled children in Eugene.
