Senior Campus Visitation Weekend will be observed simultaneously at the University of Oregon, Eugene; Oregon State College, Corvallis; Oregon College of Education, Monmouth; Southern College of Education, Ashland, and Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls.

Every campus has planned special events ranging from ball games to style shows and outstanding entertainment featuring organization firesides and mixer dances. Arrangements have been made for pre-college orientation of campus facilities, introductions to faculty and student-body members and opportunities for discussing educational plans. A Spiritual Mission

The Reverend Thomas Hamilton, pastor of Star of the Sea Catholic church, announces a Spiritual Mission to be held in his church from April 19 to 26. The Mission will be conducted by the Reverend Richard W. Hodge, noted missionary of the Franciscan Order.

Father Hodge provides some interesting notes on his Mission Apostolate. He styles his Mission, in an interesting phrase, "A Clinic in Living." Life is our absorbing passion, he avers. Life embodies our full quota of opportunities and responsibilities. Life in itself and in its eternal fruition contains richness that only God could bestow; the ignorance of this richness, the perversion of it, inevitably bring disorder to the social body, defeat and frustration to the individual. The determining element of Life is Religion. Religion is God's own directive to the confusing pattern. To disentangle the strangling skein and rescue man and society from its sordid plight so that both can attain the dignity and prosperity provided by God, is the prime task of the day.

Socrates of old wrestled with this problem of life and he posed himself a query and supplied his answer. "Should I study the course of the sun and moon and the stars, the causes of eclipses and earthquakes? No. There is one thing I want to know first. I want to know how I, as a man, ought to live and act."

The Voice of God, through Religion, is instant with the unvarying answer. Therefore, we must put Religion into Life into everyday life, into home-life, work-life, play-life. Men are casually unfaithful to Christian principles and the social order adjusts itself to the resultant strains. But habitual and universal betrayal of moral standards eventually bursts the social fabric and is precipitated into war, class strife, race discrimination, economic and industrial clash. Thus man is engulfed in the hopeless vortex of his own making.

The Mission is a move calculated to "restore all things to Christ." It directs the beacon light of Faith into the darkness of a turbulent world. It signals to those without Faith; I and the Truth; to those in confusion; There is a Way; to those without spirit; This is the Life.

A Mission is necessarily a community activity. Whatever strengthens the moral fibre of a part of the community, is a boon to the whole community.

Religion is not a prejudice; it is a philosophy of Life. Therefore, a Mission is for Everybody.
