**Auto Operation Costs Allowed By Business Shows Another Gain**

Automobile operating costs for 1952 showed a gain over 1951 according to the American Automobile Association study just released by the Oregon State Motor Association to business and industry executives who use it in establishing car allowances.

The latest study by Runzheimer & Company warrants establishing \$1.55 per day for an auto used in business plus 3 1/2 cents a mile traveled. This is up from \$1.50 a day and the same mileage allowance fixed in 1951.

All fixed costs—insurance, license fees, depreciation—have ris-

en considerably since January 1951 the AAA reported which has brought about a rise of 7 cents a day in fixed costs. The 1951 allowance of \$1.50 a day plus mileage was based on the actual cost of \$1.46. The new average actual cost is \$1.53 a day plus mileage which is the basis of the \$1.55, plus mileage, now set.

Actual operating costs have risen from 3.28 a mile to 3.47 cents, but the 3 1/2 cents mileage allowance will still cover that cost, the Oregon State Motor Association is advising its members.

Portland, Oregon, was one of the 42 cities studied to arrive at the new allowance base. The study took 1952 automobiles in the 42 basic cost areas and the anticipated annual mileage of each car was 18,000 miles. In Portland the average standard miles per gallon was 14.5 against

the national average of 14.738. The Portland normal gasoline cost was 32 cents against the national average of 30.179 cents. The Portland cost for gas and oil per mile was 2.41 cents against the national average of 2.233 cents. Portland's maintenance cost per mile was 75 cents against a national average of .738 cents; tire cost 39 cents against .507 cents.
