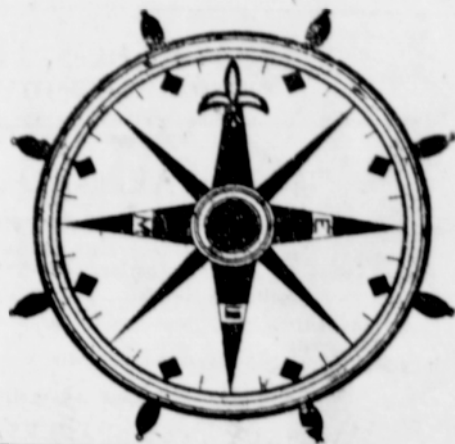

CITY COUNCIL GIVES FULL SUPPORT TO CHETCO COVE DEVELOPMENT

The Brookings Chamber of Commerce appeared before the City Council on Tuesday of this week and obtained the complete and wholehearted support of the campaign currently being waged by the Chamber in its

efforts to obtain shipping facilities from Chetco Cove.

It was emphasized that if all individuals and organizations unite solidly behind this project, every indication points to favorable action by the governmental organizations concerned.

The City Council has taken the first step in indicating active support. It should now behoove each and everyone of us to join our Chamber of Commerce and take active part in a project which can be as beneficial to our area as the timber itself.

The resolution, as adopted by the council, is reprinted below:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of City of Brookings, Oregon, that in view of the campaign presently being conducted by the Brookings Chamber of Commerce to the end that this area may once again offer the advantages of low-cost, deep-water ocean transportation to business and industry of Curry County, Oregon, and northern Del Norte County, California;

We hereby recommend:

That all citizens of the area either individually or through their organizational affiliations join in endorsing and recommending the above action by the Brookings Chamber of Commerce specifically pertaining to the development of Chetco Cove through the obtaining of Federal funds for a breakwater, docks, and removal of existing hazards to navigation;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Brookings indicate its complete support of the above matter by causing copies of this resolution to be forwarded to the Portland District Office of the U.S. Army Engineers, our representatives in Washington, D.C., and such other organizations and individuals as the Board of Directors of the Brookings Chamber may recommend.
