## News From County Extension Agent

### Sheepmen Consider California Scabies Regulation

Sheepmen of Curry county are concerned about the effect which the new California regulation pertaining to the importation of sheep into the state will have on the marketing of Curry county lambs this summer. The regulation has been designed to prevent sheep scabies from coming into the State of California. It requires that all shipments of sheep or lambs into California must be accompanied by a permit from the State Department of Agriculture in California and by an inspection of certificate issued by either a representative of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry or a regular employee of the Livestock Sanitary Authority of the state of origin.

Since the nearest veterinary is located in Coos Bay or Coquille, there would be considerable expense and time lost in shipment should each lot of lambs shipped into California have to be inspected before shipment and sheepmen would have to anticipate the shipment in advance long enough to secure a permit from the California State department before moving the sheep.

Since there has never been known a case of scabies in Curry county and because there are very few sheep brought into this area from the outside, it is not likely that this regulation will have much effect in keeping scabies out of California.

Because Curry county is not an affected area, an effort is being made to secure a modification of this regulation to permit shipments into California without the necessary inspection certificates with the understanding should any of the lambs that are shipped into the slaughter yards be reshipped to feed lots, that these lambs would be inspected

### New Debudging Chemical Used On Bulbs

Last Saturday Ralph Grein and Dr. E. J. Frause from O.S.C. assisted Dick Hastings in establishing a trial application of Makeic Hydravizide. This material affects the flowring portions of the plant and prevents the lilies from blooming, eliminating the hand work of debudging later in the summer and preventing the possibility of fire spreading at that time.

It is thought that if this material works successfully it will eliminate the cost of debudging and will also tend to make the bulbs grow larger, since the growth that would normally go into developing the blooms might go into faster growth of the lily bulbs.

### 4-H Summer School Scholarships Pledged

The Gold Beach Rotary Club was the first organization to pledge two 4-H summer school scholarships this year.
