Curry Leads Oregon Counties In Population Gains

Curry lead the counties of the state in showing the greatest percent of increase in population from the time the 1950 census was taken through July 1, 1952, according to tabulations in the current issue of the Oregon Business Review.

The percent of increase for Curry county was 15.6, with Coos running a close second with 15.4 per cent increase, and Douglas county third with a rise of 14.7 per cent.

The state as a whole showed an increase in population of 5.3 per cent. The population rose from a total of 1,521,341 to 1,602,090, according to the publication.

The Review is published by the bureau of business research of the school of business administration in the University of Oregon with Wesley C. Ballaine, professor of business administration, as editor.

The greatest numerical rise in counties outside of Multnomah occurred in Lane county, which noted an increase from 125,776 to 139,167. Multnomah county population, exclusive of Portland population, rose from 97,909 to 105,036. Portland residents climbed from the 1950 census total of 373,628 to 387,246, a percentage increase of 3.6.

The tabulations were based on the federal census of 1950 adjusted for births, deaths and migrations into and out of the county.

Cancer Committee Plans Campaign

The annual crusade of the Oregon division, American Cancer Society, was held in Curry county and the rest of the state during the month of April, which has been designated cancer control month by the U.S. Congress.

The campaign in Curry county will be under the direction of Mrs. Raymond L. Erickson of Gold Beach.

The crusade has a two-fold purpose, according to Mrs. Erickson, to raise funds to support the various research, education and service programs of the society and to educate persons with the facts about cancer, the nation's No. 2 killer.

"Cancer education is most important at this time," Mrs. Erickson explained, "because early diagnosis and treatment are the most potent weapons against the disease. If persons know the cancer danger, signals, their chances of early diagnosis and treatment are much greater."

The answer to the disease still rests in the research scientists' laboratories, however, and millions of ACS funds have been granted to scientists throughout the nation in past years to aid them in their work. William B. Feldenheimer of Portland, state crusade chairman, reports.

The Southern Curry county committee for the American Cancer Society is planning the 1953 campaign, and hopes there will be very fine response from this area when the material is mailed.

All-Out Campaign For Safe Boating

The death toll for summer boating in the Pacific Northwest went up 13 per cent last year as shown by figures released here today by Captain W. J. Austermann, acting commander of the 13th Coast Guard district.

Also shown was an increase of 14 per cent in calls received from vessels in distress and an increase of 33 per cent in lives saved.
