A. R. Ravens and J. I. Clinton of Roseburg are here again this week, continuing their engineering work in this area.

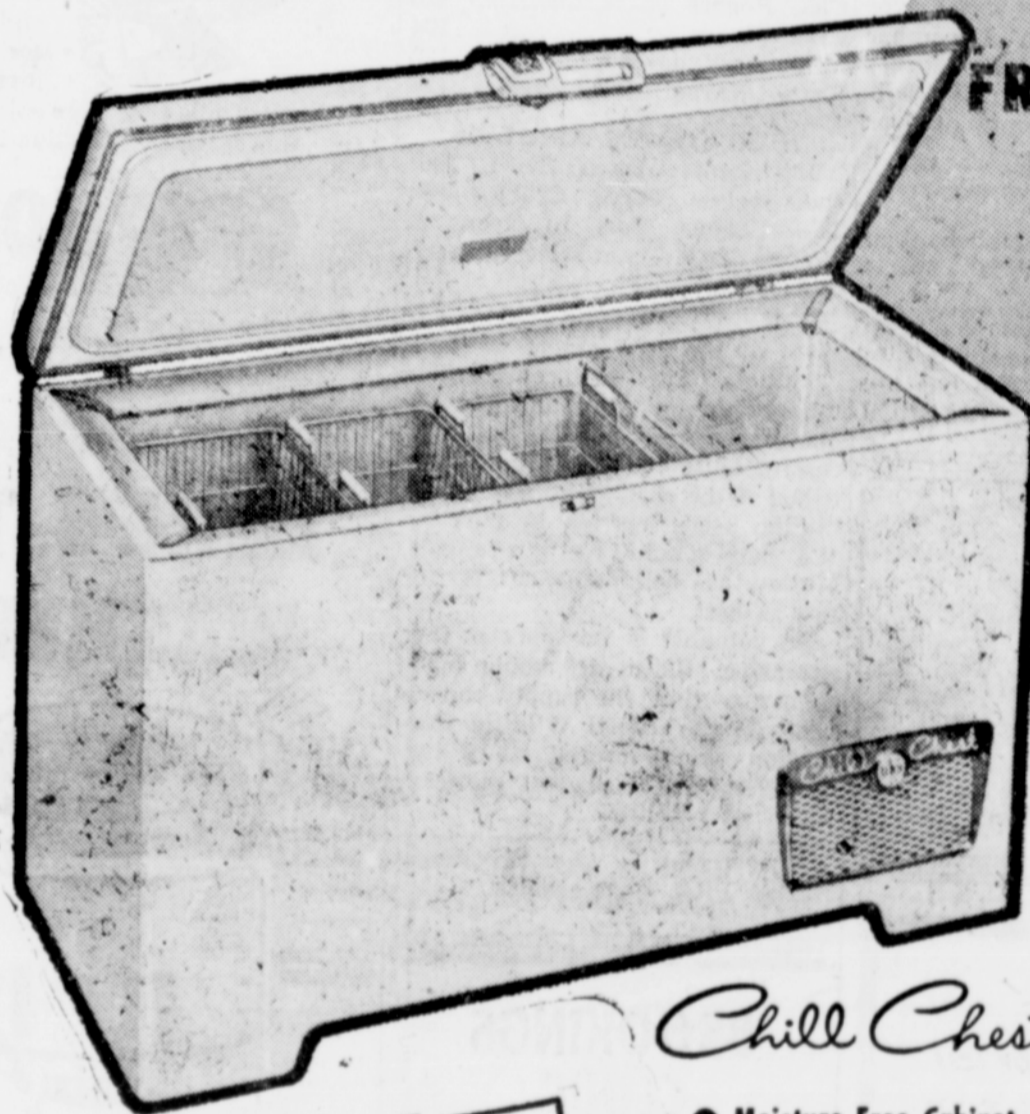
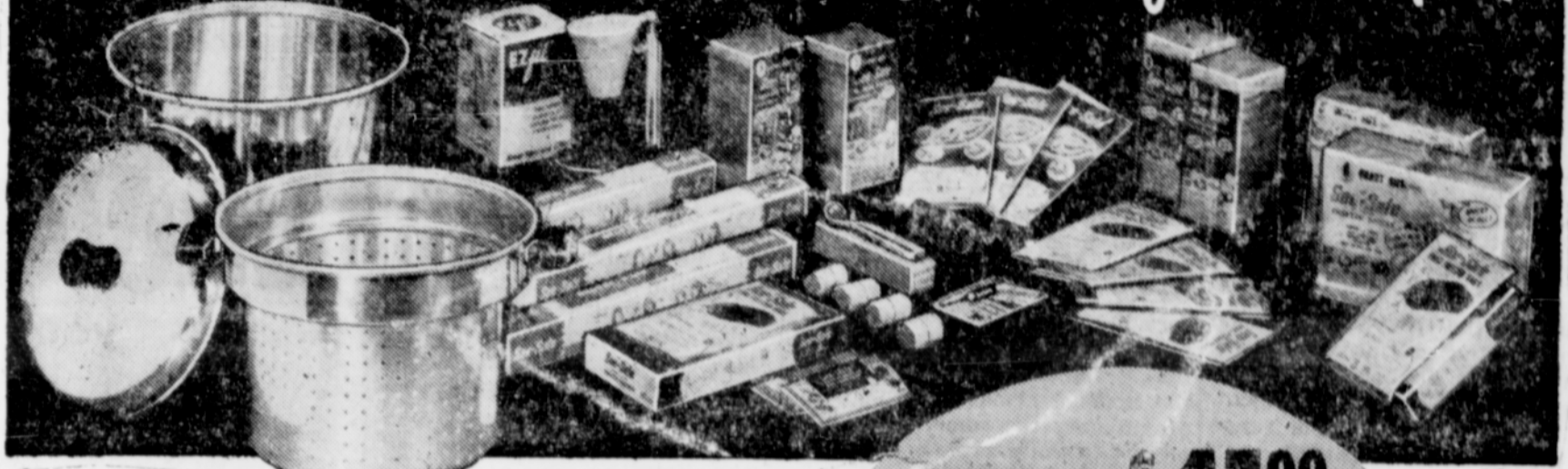
