## C. OF C. DISCUSSES TELEVISION AND DAYLIGHT TIME

The Brookings Chamber of Commerce held its April dinner meeting last Thursday evening, April 30, at the Harbor Grange hall. An informative and interesting talk was given by Percy Evans on the forthcoming broadcasts of television from Station KIEM at Eureka. He advised that good reception should be obtained in the Brookings-Harbor area, but it will be most important to have a proper antenna installation. The station will be affiliated with the Columbia Broadcasting System, and will therefore be able to offer a well-rounded and up-to-date program. Broadcasting of "live" performances will be made as soon as hook-up can be made to the coaxial cable from San Francisco.

A brief discussion was held on the matter of Daylight Saving Time for our area, and while no vote was taken on this matter, it was the consensus of opinion of those present that the Brookings-Harbor area adjust their business hours to conform with daylight time.
