less confusion if we adopted fast time. It was suggested that it first be determined what action Gold Beach plans to take on the matter before voluntarily advancing our clocks.

A very active committee program is now evident within the Chamber as the following reports were presented:

TREASURER — a balance of approximately \$2,000 in the bank, with a total paid-in membership of 125.

HIGHWAY — Chairman Knox reported that definite progress can be made towards the establishment of a road between here and the valley if we work constantly toward unity between our area and theirs, so that when the time comes we can present a strong united appeal, and thus greatly enhance its success.

PUBLICATIONS — The four-color tourist information brochure is now nearing completion, and as soon as the aerial shots are made of the town, the final proofs will be presented to the Board of Directors. Distribution of 13,000 brochures can then be made within thirty days. It was pointed out that while a necessary delay will prevent them from having full effect on this year's tourist trade, they will be of a quality which will insure their use for a number of years to come—thus resulting in a much lower net cost for the Chamber.

HOUSING — A recent reply was received from the State Forester's office granting complete approval of his office for our use of the Brookings Guard Station property on which to construct a tourist information center. Final details will now be worked out with the local, district supervisor as to construction and exact location on the property.

HARBOR — Chairman Grayshel gave a presentation in outline form of his economic brief on the area, highlighting our present production and tonnage figures, together with the savings to be realized on freight costs through water transportation. He is currently preparing a brief which is soon to be submitted to the U. S. Board of Army Engineers supporting our request for development of the Chetco Cove project. The necessity of our forming a Port District was emphasized, as was the advisability of planning for wharf construction from which some shipping

could be done. In line with this project, additional resolutions supporting the Chamber's efforts have been received from numerous other civic and service organizations in the area.

The increased attendance at the monthly dinner meeting has been very gratifying to the Chamber, and attendance is averaging 100 and over at every meeting. All members, and other interested in community betterment and advancement are urged to attend these meetings—a rewarding evening will be yours in the form of Brookings, seal chairman.
