

## Brookings Beavers Edge Merchants

The first practice game of the season for the Brookings Beavers resulted in a 9 to 7 win over the Crescent City Merchants in a rather loosely played game on the local diamond Sunday.

The Beavers got off to a three-run lead in the first on Ron Monello's drive between right and center which rolled for a home run and scored Bill Wallace and Frank Burdell ahead of him. Gale Allman, starting Merchant hurler, was driven from the mound in the fifth when the Beavers broke loose again with five runs on five hits. Brookings got its final tally in the sixth on Monello's walk, his steal off second, advance to third on Len Reynoldson's short single to left, and subsequent score on Don Karn's squeeze bunt. This was the only run off Don Clausen in 3 1/3 innings of relief.

Beaver Manager Jim Lowman got by the Merchants in classy style for four innings, allowing a single to Tex Gatlin in the second and a double by George Yamor in the fourth with two down. The first Merchant run came in the fifth on Mike Whalen's low liner to left, which eluded Kenny Kimura on an attempted shoe-string catch and went for a home run. Lowman was the victim of some loose support in the sixth as three boots and four hits handed Crescent City five unearned runs. Whalen's second homer with two on was the highlight of the inning. Kimura relieved Lowman with two down and stopped the Merchant rally as he fielded Bill Loftin's tap and threw him out at first.

Crescent City plated the seventh and last run in the eighth without the aid of a hit, the tally being the result of two Beaver errors and a wild pitch.

The Beavers travel to Crescent City next Sunday for a return game scheduled for Peterson Park at 2:00 p.m. (daylight saving time).
