

DELAY AND THE LOST 150,000

Delay, whatever the cause, is
the vitally important factor in
the present high cancer death
rate.

Statistics indicate there will
be 400,000 new cancer cases in
1953. About 150,000 of these pa-
tients will die within one year.

One can't prevent cancer, but
one can do something about re-
ducing the "lost 150,000."

Many cancers when treated
early can be permanently cured—
as many as 75 to 85 per cent.
Late treatment, however, is al-
most always a losing proposition.

Why, if cancer is curable, do
we see so much late cancer?

There are many reasons—none
of them corrected very easily.
Despite a great educational ef-
fort, people still ignore the clear
danger signals which mean can-
cer:

1. Any sore that does not heal.
2. A lump or thickening in the
breasts or elsewhere.
3. Unusual bleeding or dis-
charge.
4. Any change in wart or mole.
5. Persistent indigestion or dif-
ficulty in swallowing.
6. Persistent hoarseness or
cough.
7. Any change in normal bowel
habits.

Invaluable time is lost when
a person, because of fear, neglect,
apathy or prudery, fails to con-
sult a physician when any one
of the danger signs appears.
