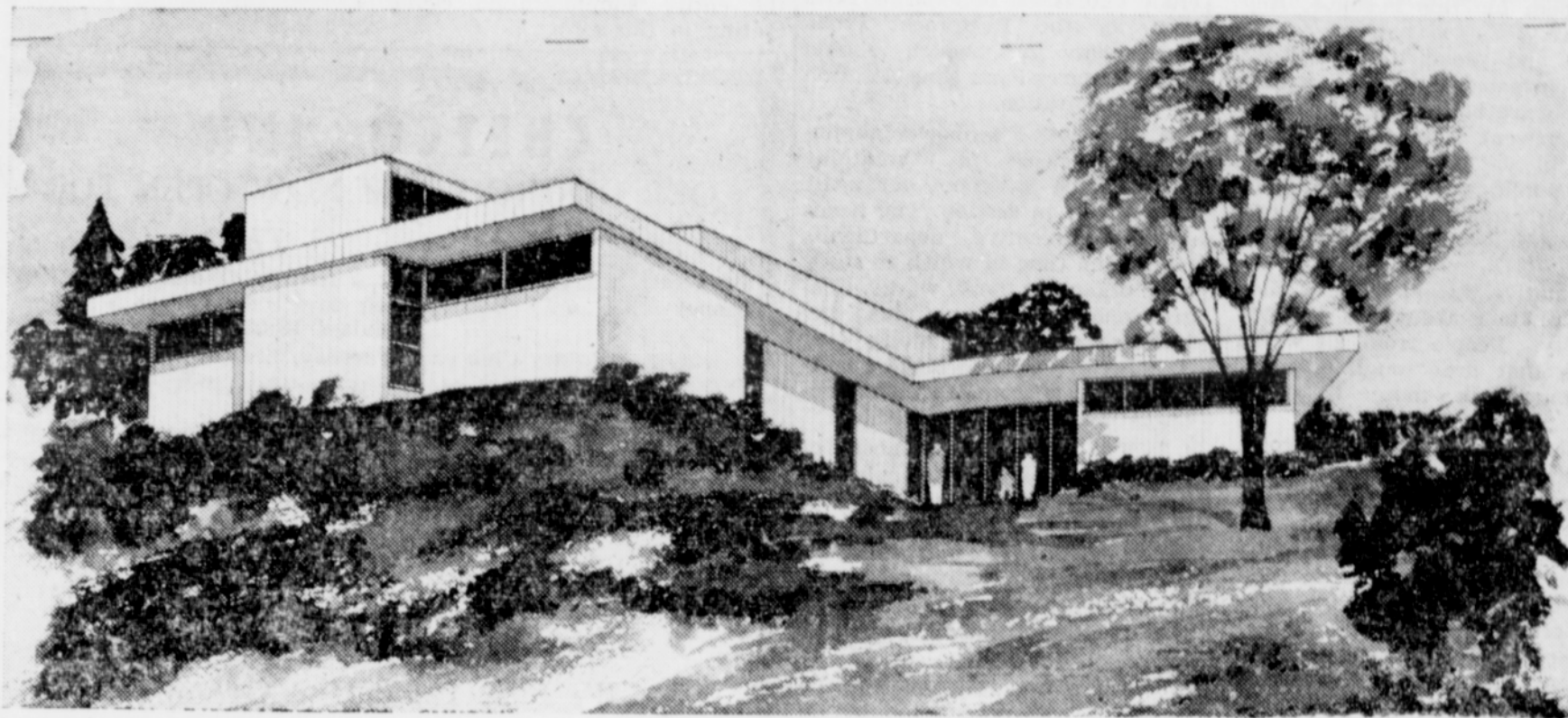

Seventh-Day Adventist Church Dedication Services



S-DA Church To Be Dedicated Sat.

June 13 is the day set aside as the dedication date for the Brookings Seventh-Day Adventist church. It has been occupied for a little more than a year and is now completely free of debt. It is the policy of this Christian organization to postpone the consecration of its churches until such time that no debts are held against them.

Elder C. A. Scriven will give the dedicatory address. He will be assisted by Elder J. C. Kozel and Elder L. E. Biggs.

The consecration service will begin at 3:30 p.m. and be preceded by a sacred concert under the direction of Mrs. G. P. Christiansen at 3:00 p.m.

Mrs. Ross Putnam has offered her organ for the service.

"Friends and neighbors in the Brookings-Harbor area are invited to join in this dedication service and will be most welcome," said Pastor Manson Metcalf.

Adventist churches are being built in Gold Beach and Port Orford, whose congregations are expected to attend this service. The Gold Beach church will be finished in July.

Located on the height overlooking the business district, and next to the Chetco Inn, this beautiful edifice of modern architecture was designed by Robert Fisher of Grants Pass. All on one floor, it has rooms for Sabbath school and Dorcas Welfare society. A sound-proof room at the rear of the building was designed for mothers with children, faces the rostrum with a large glass wall. A loud-speaker from the pulpit carries into the room.

Mickey Improved After Accident; Gene Expected

"Mickey is much improved" is the morning's report from Dr. Paul Ronniger on his condition, and "Gene is on his way home."

Blair "Mickey" Gould was critically injured Sunday as the result of a car accident when the car he was driving struck the abutment on the Chetco River bridge as he was returning from the Rod and Gun club meeting about 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

He was taken by ambulance, driven by Bud Stotenburg, immediately to Seaside hospital. There he was found to have a fractured skull, three broken ribs, dislocated hip, slashed tongue, all upper teeth out except three, and cuts about the face and neck.

Although he had not regained consciousness this morning, Dr. Ronniger was much encouraged by his condition. "He has made improvement each day and has started reacting to pain," stated the doctor.

Lt. Gene Gould, son of Mr. and Mrs. Blair Gould, stationed in Korea, was notified of his father's accident and condition by the Red Cross. He is now on his way home.

Dr. Ronniger remained with Mickey almost constantly the first 36 hours and has had the assistance of a bone specialist. Everything possible is being done for him. Mrs. Gould and Barbara have been at his bedside constantly, awaiting the slightest sign of recognition.

Gould's Shoe store has been kept open through the assistance of Mrs. Bud Stotenburg and Mrs. J. O. Anderson. Mrs. Ritchey is doing special nursing at the hospital and Bradley Page is one of the chief chauffeurs for Mrs. Gould and Barbara.

HI-WAY MARKET GRAND OPENING SCHEDULED FOR SATURDAY 13

The newest business in this area, Hi-Way Market, will have a Grand Opening on Saturday, June 13. For more than a week now the doors have been open for business in the grocery and produce section. Hank Wilbanks, held up by slow delivery of equipment, will be ready to serve customers by this weekend.

The double spread advertisement in the middle section of this issue lists specials for Friday, June 12 and Saturday, June 13. Demonstrations and special specials will be featured Saturday on the Grand Opening date.

Hi-Way Market is housed in the Campbell building, located one-fourth mile northwest of the center of Brookings on Highway 101. A portion of the building is used by the Dairy Creem.

Proprietors, Don and Lyle Vaughn, have the distinction of being the youngest businessmen of this section. Although young in years, they have had experience in retailing of food. Don began at the tender age of five when he picked huckleberries at Lewiston, Idaho, and sold them. When eleven he worked after school and on Saturdays at Economy Market at the same place.

The Vaughn family moved to Brookings June 7, 1946. Residents living here at that time will remember that Don began working for Thor Ask at the Brookings Market August 3, 1946, and con-

tinued until after he was graduated from the high school and married Yolande Ettinger. He was then connected with a wholesale produce company, trucking from San Francisco through here, and lived at Crescent City. At the same time he worked for Piggly Wiggly at that place.

Lyle has been a shadow of his older brother all his life. He also became interested in the sale of foodstuffs at an early age when he worked for Thor Ask as bus boy. He served "a hitch" under Hank Wilbanks in the meat department at Redfield's.

Hank Wilbank, proprietor of the meat market of Hi-Way Market, comes from a family of meat packers with three brothers working in the meat industry. Before coming to Brookings a couple of years ago he was associated in that business with a brother in Florence. Mr. Wilbanks came from Alabama to the Washington coast where he was married. Mrs. Wilbanks assisted her husband in the meat market while at Redfield's.

Lyle, just over the "kitten stage," was made a Lion member Wednesday evening. Hank also is a Lion and Don enjoys Barber-shoppers.
