Letter From Washington

HARRIS ELLSWORTH, M.C.

AS I WATCH the scene here there keeps occurring to me the thought that the best interests of the country would be served by the earliest possible adjournment of this session of Congress, and a long recess. Let's look at some of the reasons in support of this idea.

1. Other than appropriations bills which must be completed, very few matters are pending before Congress which cannot easily, and perhaps beneficially be carried over into the next session. The few urgent items include extensions of expiring laws such as the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act which should have Congressional consideration before expiration.

2. The new Eisenhower administration needs a "breathing spell" which it cannot get while Congress is in session. The heads of the executive departments need some time in which to study and organize their work. Congressional demands, plus the staggering task of taking over the operation of the biggest business on earth, makes calm consideration almost impossible.

3. The individual members of the House and Senate, plunged suddenly into a majority control after nearly 20 years in the minority, need the perspective a look at the whole situation from a different angle, which only a few months at home can give them.

4. Some real, but more often imagined, differences appear to be developing between some Republican members of Congress and the administration. It must be noted, however, that the differences are strictly individual and in no sense organized revolts. There is no "split" in the Republican party as such. A little time at home and conversations with constituents would most likely knock off a lot of rough edges and sharp corners from some individual Congressional attitudes. This I believe because I have not yet noted any serious differences in basic principles. The trouble seems to stem from a "he wants to do that way but I think it should be done this way" attitude. I think it might come as a surprise to some Senators and

Representatives to find out when they go home that President Eisenhower and his policies are mighty popular with the folks who do the voting.

Consider one example which is similar to what is happening regarding many items. Recently the House passed a supplemental appropriation bill which involved funds for the Veteran Administration. An amendment was offered to add 10 million dollars to the amount recommended by the Appropriations Committee and this move was defeated. Those who voted against the amendment found themselves charged with an attempt to deprive veterans of medical care. At the time the amendment was offered, the Veterans Administration admitted that it would have 13 million dollars of surplus funds available for medical care at the end of the fiscal year. Obviously, the extra 10 million dollars was not needed and would have merely increased the surplus to 23 million dollars.

◆ IF YOU could spend some time here in my office and see my mail, telegrams and listen in on telephone calls, I think you might join me in wondering sometimes if people really WANT to cut the high cost of Federal government and our high, almost unbearable taxes. I have voted against opposition party attempts to increase appropriations and will continue to do so, but I wish there could be some magic method devised to make everyone understand that the reductions we are making are to eliminate WASTE. We are striving for better government at less cost with the entire administration cooperating in this effort.
