

Higher Standard For Postmaster Examination

The first examination for postmaster at Brookings, Oregon, \$4770 a year, under new, more exacting eligibility requirements recently agreed upon by the U.S. Civil Service commission and the Post Office department will be open for receipt of applications until July 14, 1953, the commission announced this week.

All previously existing postmaster examinations for first-, second-, and third-class post offices and lists of eligibles were cancelled recently. Higher standards of eligibility were prescribed for the filling of the more than 1,700 vacant positions throughout the country.

The commission is taking all possible steps through special publicity to civic and other community organizations to encourage well qualified persons to apply for the examination.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least two years of experience showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Competitors must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability, and character. There is a one-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 25 years of age and must not have passed their sixty-third birthday.

Application forms must be received in the U. S. Civil Service commission, Washington 25, D. C. not later than the closing date.
