

Jacks Bump Beavers Twice

The potent Coos Bay-North Bend Lumber Jacks, boasting of no less than 11 ex-pros in their lineup, visited Brookings last Sunday and walked off with both games of the double header. The twin victory probably wasn't as easy as expected. The Jacks barely squeaked past the Beavers in the opener by a 6 to 5 score and stopped a two-run rally in the bottom of the ninth with the tying run on base. With one down, Whitey Matson, pinch hitting for Jaek Stephenson, singled through the box and Manager Jim Lowman, batting for Coleman, doubled to left, both scoring on Ken Kimura's sharp hit to right. Had it not been for a great stop by Roy Nicely, ex-San Francisco Seal, on Jack Selby's potential hit through the box, forcing Kimura at second, Brookings probably would have been the winner.

Corky Coleman, young left-hander from OSC, made a very creditable showing after a somewhat shaky start when the Jacks scored twice in the first and added another brace of runs in the second. Dick Bishop, ex-USC star and more recently with Hollywood and Spokane, limited the Beavers to nine hits. Kimura and Burdell each had two hits in the opener.

The seven inning nightcap started out like an easy win for the visitors with the Jacks getting to Jim Nierman for eight runs in the first four frames and then chasing across another six counters off Nierman and Lowman in the sixth. Al Janszen was meanwhile holding the Beavers to a scratch single in the first five

innings. Kimura opened the sixth with a base hit but Selby hit into a double play. Five hits, including Burdell's triple and Jay Dean's double, plus two Jack errors gave Brookings four runs. The Beavers tied into Janszen again in the seventh with two down scoring five more runs on an equal number of hits. Two runners were left stranded as Kimura was out at first on a close play to end the game with Brookings trailing 14 to 9. Leading Beaver hitters in the second game were Dick Price with two hits in four trips and Jim Lowman and Ron Monello each with two blows in two official times at the plate.

The Beavers are in for another tough test when the Drain Black Sox, headed by Manager Roy Helser of Coast league fame, come to town for a double header next Sunday afternoon at one o'clock. Short scores:
