The amount of precipitation for this area in the last fiscal year ending June 30 was about ten inches above normal. The average rainfall recorded by the Brookings Weather Bureau station is 75 or 76 inches.

Precipitation from July 1952 through December amounted to 30.14 inches. The amount of moisture from January 1953 to July was 65.63, making a total of 95.77 for the fiscal year. New Streets Open

New streets are being opened in Brookings as tracts are subdivided and opened for the building of new homes.

The Woodland Park tract, owned and planned by Mr. and Mrs. Glessner Hoagland, is bisected by a new street called Alder connecting Del Norte lane with Highway 101. Spruce is open from Oak, along Azalea Lanes west to Alder, and Hemlock parallel to Spruce and next street south will be usable as soon as a culvert is installed by the city.

The Hoaglands plan calls for Spruce street to continue as Spruce drive in a circle through their tract to reach all lots and encircle a park in the center.

A few homes have already been built in the project and when developed will be a most beautiful residential area.
