Scouts Leave For Jamboree Friday

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and Coquille will have Scoutmaster Howard Crane in charge, with assistants Tom Greathouse and Beryl Baker.

Henry Kerr will join the troop in Eugene and accompany them to the Jamboree by train. Mr. Kerr holds a committee position. Beside the 20 boys from Brookings, seven boys are from Bandon, eight from Mapleton, making 35 boys in troop 24. Bob Dimmick has charge of transportation from Brookings to Eugene.

Dick Fadling will act as senior patrol leader, Dick Berger, quartermaster, Phillip Kessler and Bobby Dimmick as patrol leaders. The occasion is the third national Jamboree, and the first to be held on the west coast.

And local Scouts are experiencing an unusual opportunity in being able to attend.

The temporary community of 50,000 will be larger than the neighboring city of Santa Ana, and will contain more persons than in each of half the counties of the nation. More than 30,000 tents will be set up.

Even getting to and away from the Jamboree site calls for intensive planning. Within three days time, the three railroads and seven nearby depots must handle all the nation's Jamboree scouts on their way in. Six days later, the exodus will repeat the move.

A special train, seven cars long, will take the Oregon Trail Council's 200-plus youths to the site, leaving them there among the first to arrive. The local boys have a campsite on a bluff overlooking Newport Harbor.

Ranger Station Open on Easy St.

Temporary offices of the new Forest Service ranger station are now open in the Denn Supply building on Easy street, while a permanent station is being built near the fire patrol building in the eastern part of town on 101 highway.

W. E. Ragland, ranger of the Siskiyou National forest, will be in charge of this district. He expects to bring his family here before the beginning of school. Mr. Ragland will be assisted by Jim Crossen, forestry graduate from Missoula, Mont., and Sinclair Snow, clerk, graduate student from North Dakota, in the station on Easy street.

There are four lookouts in the Chetco district and one guard station, from the California line to Hunters creek. They are Mt. Emily, Vulcan peak, Longridge and Snow Camp at Pistol River and the guard station at Longridge. The Westmore government camp ground, up the Winchuck river is also patrolled.

Boys from Stanford, Pennsylvania State and Virginia colleges man the lookouts through the summer and act as firemen, do map reading and act as clerks.

LEGAL NOTICE

PROCLAMATION:—WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgment of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or allow the rapid spread of fires which might occur or because of the inaccessible character of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads and WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following areas designated as: AREA NO. R-1: All National Forests in Oregon and adjacent areas protected by the United States Forest Service, as follows: Adjacent to Siskiyou National Forest: Section 31, T. 32 S., R. 8 W.; Section 36, T. 32 S., R. 9 W.; Section 36, T. 33 S., R. 8 W.; Section 36, T. 34 S., R. 8 W.; Sections 7, 8, 9, 16, 17, 18, 19, 30, 31, T. 34 S., R. 11 W.; Section 36, T. 34 S., R. 13 W.; Section 36, T. 35 S., R. 8 W.; Sections 6, 7, 16, to 20 inclusive, 29 and 30, T. 35 S., R. 11 W.; S $\frac{1}{2}$ Section 10, Sections 11 to 16 inclusive, S $\frac{1}{2}$ Section 17, Sections 20, 29, 30 and 31, T. 35 S., R. 12 W.; Sections 4, 8, 9, 16, 17, and 18, T. 39 S., R. 12 W.; and those portions of Sections 1 and 12, T. 40 S., R. 7 W. lying east of Sucker Creek; Sections 3, 10, T. 41 S., R. 8 W.; Section 16, T. 41 S., R. 11 W.; Section 16, T. 41 S., R. 12 W. NOW, THEREFORE, I, PAUL L. PATTERSON, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above-described areas to be unlawful and do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions: (1) To refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas. (2) To secure a permit issued by the forester or a fire warden before building a campfire other than at improved, designated and posted campgrounds on such areas. (3) To have as a part of his or her equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian and/or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires. This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 1st day of July, 1953, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the 31st day of December 1953. Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 26th day of June, 1953.
