No bids were received by the State Highway commission for the Brookings paving project of 0.23 miles of Pacific and Hillside avenues. Bids for other Curry and Coos county highway work were opened at a meeting of the commission held in Portland June 26. The action of the commission regarding each:

CURRY COUNTY: Brookings (Pacific and Hillside avenues) paving project in Brookings. City project. 0.23 miles of paving. No bids received.

CURRY COUNTY: Rinehart Creek bridge on the Oregon Coast highway south of Port Orford. Federal aid project. Construct a reinforced concrete and steel truss bridge approximately 356 feet in length. Awarded, Peter Kiewit Sons' company, Longview, Washington at \$162,410.00.

COOS COUNTY: China Camp Marsh section of Oregon Coast highway about three miles north of Coquille. State project. 0.48 miles of grading and 0.28 miles of oil mat surfacing. Awarded, Keith Brothers, Medford, at \$70,612.00.

COOS COUNTY: Empire (Michigan avenue) paving project in Empire. City project. 0.27 miles of paving. Awarded, Porter W. Yett, Portland, at \$11,436.00.

Myrtle Point (Ash, Second and Third streets paving project in Myrtle Point. City project. 0.21 miles of paving. Awarded, Porter W. Yett, Portland at \$13,170.00.
