Oregon State Fair Premium Book Out

SALEM, July 16—Distribution by mail of more than 2,000 premium booklets for this year's Oregon state fair to former fair exhibitors and others has just been completed, according to Leo Spitzbart, fair manager. Included are classifications for dairy and beef cattle, draft horses, sheep and goats, swine, poultry, rabbits, honey and bees, land products including fruit, vegetables and grain; floral and garden, art breads, cakes, food preservation, including freezing, and ladies' textiles.

All classifications are substantially the same as for last year except for sheep. Regulations for this department were written by a committee from the Oregon Purebred Sheep association, Mr. Spitzbart said.

Anyone can get a premium list by writing to the state fair, Salem. Requests should state the classification in which the person is interested so that the correct entry form can be returned with the booklet, Spitzbart emphasized.
