

Gurian to Head Polio Drive

PORTLAND—(Special)—John J. Gurian, 53-year-old Portland business and civic leader, has been appointed Oregon state chairman of the March of Dimes by President Basil O'Connor of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, according to an announcement received from National headquarters in New York this week.

Gurian succeeds Dr. E. T. Hedlund of Portland who died last month. Dr. Hedlund, Portland postmaster, had served as head of the state March of Dimes organization since the inception of the annual campaign for polio funds in 1938.

"I worked closely with Dr. Hedlund in several National Foundation activities in recent years and found him an industrious and inspirational leader", Gurian said in a statement of acceptance. "It is my earnest hope that I can carry on in the fine tradition he established. The current Gamma Globulin inoculations are proving to be effective as a temporary preventive against the paralytic effects of polio, but it is not the final answer." Mr. Gurian added, "A vaccine to provide permanent immunity against polio is the next step, and the intensive work that is being done by National Founda-

tion grantees must have our continued and unfaltering support. The March of Dimes campaigns are the only sources of funds for this program. It must be very successful."

Gurian, who has lived in Portland virtually all of his 53 years, is a graduate of Whitman College and he took graduate work in finance at the University of Chicago. He is a general partner in the widely-known investments firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Beane, with which he has been associated for some 20 years.

Is Your Home Safe?

Your attention is invited to the many hazardous conditions in and around Brookings, such as defective flues, improper electric wiring and appliances, rotten and broken steps, etc. Sometimes you can see these conditions, and realize the danger involved. The City of Brookings has a building inspector who may be called upon for advice concerning the construction of your flues, sills, steps, etc., but there is no electrical inspector except one Oregon State Inspector whose district runs from Florence, Oregon to the California state line, a distance of 200 miles, and some fifty miles inland. This inspector is able to make only four or five trips a year, each consisting usually of one or two days only. These days are usually spent in checking permit wiring by licensed electricians. Home owner's permits take second place, because the licensed contractor's permits must be approved, in many cases before he is paid for his labor and materials.

The unlicensed wireman's work is never inspected, because he uses no permits, and therefore he is not responsible for the work he does, unless he is caught in the act of wiring. His wiring is the most dangerous of all electrical installations. He has no knowledge or regard for overloaded circuits or services, or of safe wiring. His motto is GET THROUGH, GET PAID, AND GET OUT! Usually his work is defective. If trouble develops a licensed electrician is called in, and only then does the owner realize he has been taken. His wiring job is, in many cases, a total loss.

These conditions are usually found where an electric clothes dryer, a hot water tank, a range, a deep freeze or an electric heater has been added to the wiring of your home. Did a licensed electrician do the wiring in your home? You'll be wise to find out.
