

CHIEFS THUMP BEAVERS TWICE; DROP TO CELLAR

The Brookings Beavers' trip to Roseburg over the weekend was disastrous as far as making any headway in the win column was concerned. In fact the Chiefs shoved the Beavers into a tie for the cellar position by taking both games by 9 to 0 and 10 to 6 scores.

The Beavers suffered their first shut-out of the season Saturday night with left-hander Jerry Bartow from Washington State college wielding an effective white-wash brush and allowing only 3 hits, all singles by Bob Selsor, Jay Dean and Frank Burdell. He also sent 16 Beavers back to the dug-out via the strike-out route.

In the meantime Roseburg hitters slammed Manager Jim Lowman for 4 runs in the first inning on 4 hits and 2 errors. Jim Nierman, as reliever, retired 9 consecutive Chiefs in the 2nd, 3rd and 4th, allowed 1 run on 2 hits in the 5th but ran into a 4-run Roseburg surge in the 6th as the Beaver defense again failed.

The Sunday game almost ceased to be a contest in the 1st inning as the Chiefs came up with a 6-run blast at Corky Coleman's expense on 2 hits, 3 bases on balls and 3 Brookings errors. Coleman eased through a scoreless 2nd inning but a walk and a double, good for a run to start the 3rd, brought shortstop Bob Selsor to the mound. His 2 walks, a wild pitch and an infield out resulted in 2 more Chief runs. However, after that Selsor pitched fine ball, allowing only 4 scattered hits the rest of the way and definitely earned himself a starting pitcher assignment.

The Beavers touched Chief pitcher Ernie Stites for 2 runs in the 3rd, single tallies in the 4th and 6th, another brace of runs in the 8th but the big Roseburg lead was too much to overcome. Jay Dean with 4 hits in 8 trips to the plate and Bob Selsor with 2 for 7

were the only Brookings batters with more than one hit in the two games.

No road trips for the Beavers the next two weeks. They meet the Bandon Millers here in a double header next Sunday afternoon, with the Coquille Loggers to follow a week later.

Fish Commission Surveys Shellfish

Rae Baxter of Astoria and James McCauley of Newport have just completed a survey of shell fish in the Brookings-Gold Beach area, the first made by the State Fish Commission.

McCauley, who is an invertebrate biologist from OSC, surveyed the northern part of the county, while Baxter handled the Brookings area.

The two are attempting to gain some idea of the incidence of the various shellfish in this area. The results of their survey will be released later by the commission.

Channel Opened At River Mouth

The bar on the mouth of the Chetco was opened last week by local sportsmen, as anglers here prepared for the fall salmon run.

Work on the bar, which had closed the channel which the salmon come up, was done by sportsmen and business men in this area. Volunteers manned the equipment which opened a wide channel for the fish.
