SALMON CLOSE; FISHING GOOD

The salmon fishing is good, and the fish are getting closer. That's the report this week from Parker's Anchorage, at the mouth of the river.

John Hewitt reports that the salmon are close off-shore, and numbers are mounting. Schools of both chinook and silversides are becoming increasingly evident.

A few salmon are in the river, but not enough yet to make fishing for them very lucrative.

John says, however, that salmon being caught are fatter, and give the appearance of being ready to come into the river. Fish that are being caught are running up to about 20 pounds.

Perch fishing at the mouth of the river is fair, and trout fishing in the Chetco is pretty slow, according to John. Conditions on the Winchuck are pretty similar to the Chetco, with perhaps a few more salmon in.

Coos-Curry Shows Larger Sales

Coos-Curry Electric Coop reported slightly reduced earnings as contrasted to last year, at their monthly board meeting held in Brookings Saturday.

The reduction in earnings was due to the large cut made in electric rates last year, according to Manager Bruce Shavere. Actually, July saw increased usage of electricity, but not enough to return earnings to levels comparable to those before rate decreases.

Kilowatt hour consumption for July was roughly 500,000 above July a year ago, while revenues dipped about \$2300, from the same period.

Residential usage of electricity has increased greatly since Coos-Curry instituted its reduced rates, according to Manager Shavere. Slight decreases were registered in large consumer sales, reflecting restricted operations because of weather and other factors.

Annis Sees Change In Brookings Area

Gerald Annis of Portland called at the Pilot office on Thursday. He was on vacation with his wife and two children. They had been to Crater Lake and Oregon Caves and were returning home via the Coast route.
