BEAVERS DROP FINAL GAMES

The Beavers closed the 1953 season at Drain over the weekend by dropping their final two games to the Black Sox by 10 to 2 and 8 to 5 scores. The double victory enabled the Sox to cinch the second half championship with 10 wins and 2 losses, the same as their record for the first half.

The twin loss for Brookings and Medford's split with the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks left Brookings and Medford tied for last place in the 2nd half standings.

The powerful Sox slammed out a total of 16 base hits off Jim Nierman Saturday night while Bill Hanauska was holding the Beavers to 5 hits and lone tallies in the 8th and 9th. Bob Selsor played a sparkling game at short with 10 assists and also got 3 of 5 Beaver hits. Despite the comparatively large score the game was played in the fast time of 1 hour and 37 minutes.

Lack of pitching or perhaps the lack of the right starting pitcher was a contributing factor in the Beaver 8 to 5 loss on Sunday. Bob Selsor got by the Black Sox in one, two, three style in the first inning but they drove him from the mound with 4 hits good for 4 runs in the 2nd. Kenny Kimura closed out the frame without any further damage but he, too, was tagged for 4 hits and 3 more runs in the 3rd. Jim Barrett gave up a walk and a 2-base hit in the Drain half of the 4th for the

final Sox run. Thereafter he pitched great ball and allowed only 2 hits in the last 4 innings. Manager Roy Helser rotated 6 men on the mound and the Beavers loosened up with 13 hits but 3 Sox double plays and 12 Beavers left stranded accounted for only 5 runs scored. Jay Dean with 4 for 4 and Jim Niernan with 3 for 3 led the Brookings attack. The Beavers were forced to make this trip with only nine players.

While the past season again proved that the pro-studded Southwestern Oregon league is no doubt too strong for Brookings, the Beavers made a much better showing than last year by winning 5 of the 22 league games. The losses included several very close games. In non-league tilts the Beavers won all five games played, 3 against Crescent City and one each over Grants Pass and Glendale.

Big Game Records To Be Kept

The Oregon State Game commission has undertaken the responsibility of maintaining official state records of big game trophies. Hunters of the state are asked to register any of the outstanding trophies of deer, antelope, or elk they bag in Oregon in the coming seasons. Official scoring forms are available at the regional offices of the game commission at Albany, Roseburg, Bend, LaGrande, and Hines, and also at the Portland headquarters.

Scoring sheets have been set up according to the standards used by the Boone and Crockett Club of America, and any trophy animals that qualify will receive recognition in the club's book of records of North American big game. Oregon has previously placed several records in the book.

Scores are computed from various measurements of the animal's horns or antlers; therefore, hunters who think they may have a record trophy should obtain one of the official scoring blanks in order that a proper record may be made.

The project was initiated to obtain more recognition for Oregon's big game animals and also to encourage better sportsmanship and skill in hunting.

Reminder Made Of Cutthroat Limit

Anglers fishing for sea-run cutthroat trout or "harvest trout" in the coastal streams are reminded by the state game commission of the basic bag limit for trout. The regulation states that the bag limit is "10 fish per day, not more than 5 of which may be 12 inches or over. . ."

Since most of the sea-run cutthroat exceed 12 inches in length, the second clause of the regulation should be noticed especially. Fishermen are liable for arrest if they keep more than 5 trout per day over 12 inches long. For all practical purposes, the daily bag limit on "bluebacks" is 5.

Arp Vacations

With the rate of exchange at one American dollar to 25,000 Chinese we found services and native-made articles very cheap but only until the Chinese learned to barter, he told his listeners, then it became a matter of who was the more clever bargainer.

In the native restaurants, he said, one could never be sure his roast beef was not horse meat. It might look all right, the final test was in the taste.
